

1 Introduction

1.1.1. The following character appraisal was undertaken by members of South Hykeham Parish Council in 2015.

2 Character Appraisal

Spaces

- Field, school, graveyard, wide grass verge used by villagers and walkers
- Green borders around the outside of the village
- Many footpaths
- Two bridle ways used by walkers

Layout

- Linear
- Narrow footpaths generally on one side of the road only

Streetscape

- Lamp Post Standard
- Public seat outside Church,
 Pump Hill
- Boulders
- Mainly hedges and fencing, some brick
- Litter and dog bins



Buildings

Most of the village was built late 1800s/early

1900s. Detached and semi- detached, infill building in same style as original

which are varied in small ways

 Built in bricks mainly (Lincoln Reds) slate or tiled roofs

Roads, Streets, Roofs

- Traditional two way lanes
- Narrow country lane
- Footpath one side
- Rural footpaths radiating from village (Danis law way)
- Mill Lane
- Cycle/Footpath to north

Green Natural Features

- Variety
- Tree in church grounds.
 Many trees throughout village
- A mound in the centre of the village with a large lime tree, known as Pump Hill – once was the location of the village pump

Land Uses

- Residential
- Two offices
- Church with cemetery. School/sports field
- Tyre workshop outside village curtilage
- Boundary Lane Industrial Estate, large and small units
- Around village surrounding land is in agricultural use

- Pennell's Garden Centre
- Poppyfields large housing estate

Views


- North view fields and Cathedral
- In the east various places in the village across open fields
- To the Lincoln Ridge (Waddington, Harmston, Lincoln)
- The west views to Aubourn. Open fields
- Views towards the village from public footpaths and bridleways

3 Defining Characteristics & Design Principles

- New development within South Hykeham village should directly reflect and respond to the character of the village as illustrated within this Character Appraisal.
- South Hykeham old village is unique in character and style. It has distinctive building materials principally Lincoln Red brick and slate or clay pantile roofs. Boundary treatments to the road frontages are mainly low brick wall and/or hedging, with larger boundaries and those to open space being characterised by traditional post and rail fencing. Footpath arrangements reflect the village's heritage and the surrounding land uses. Without precluding contemporary design new development should respect this local pallet of materials and the built form within the village.
- Green spaces, grass verges and green borders around the outside of the village form part of
 its character and amenity. New development should reflect this character in landscape and
 streetscape treatments.
- The green space around the Grade II* Listed St Michael and All Angels Church is important to the character of the Village and is recognised in the CLLP as an 'Important Open Space' (Local Green Space Policy). Development will not be supported where it impacts on the unbroken verges and hedgerow on Meadow Lane, or has any detrimental impact on the setting of the listed building. This demand is consistent with the NPPF which states that local policy for managing development within a Local Green Space should be consistent with policy for Green Belts. On that basis development deemed to be "inappropriate" in a Local Green Space should not be approved except in very special circumstances and substantial weight should be given to any harm to a Local Green Spaces. It is important to note that "very special circumstances" will not exist unless the potential harm to a Local Green Space and any other harm is clearly outweighed by other considerations.
- South Hykeham is part of an active farming community with access to fields from the village
 via two bridle paths Meadow Lane and Water Lane. Green footpaths and dyke sides are
 used by the community for recreation and exercise. Where possible and proportionate new
 development should provide or contribute to additional green footways.
- South Hykeham has a strong rural character. Dykes around the village and fields nearby are
 used as part of the flood scheme for surrounding areas, North Hykeham and Lincoln. New
 development should include sustainable drainage solutions and incorporate green design
 initiatives aimed at reducing carbon emissions.
