## PART 1

## 1. The Central Lincolnshire Local Plan

- 1.1 The Central Lincolnshire Joint Strategic Planning Committee (CLJSPC) is producing a joint Local Plan for the Central Lincolnshire area. The Local Plan sets out the framework for how development proposals will be considered across the districts of City of Lincoln, North Kesteven and West Lindsey to 2036 and, when adopted, will replace the current Local Plans of the three Local Authorities.
- 1.2 This evidence report (which is part of a suite of evidence documents) seeks to demonstrate how the CLJSPC has complied with the 'Duty to Cooperate' in preparing the Local Plan.

## 2. Introduction to the Duty to Cooperate

## 2.1 Localism Act 2011 and Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004

- 2.1.1 Section 110 of the Localism Act 2011 introduced Section 33A to the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004, namely the "Duty to Co-operate in relation to planning of sustainable development" (referred to here-after as the 'duty'). The duty requires planning authorities, county councils and prescribed bodies to co-operate effectively with each other when preparing:
  - Development plan documents;
  - Other local development documents;
  - Marine plans; and
  - When undertaking activities that prepare the way for the preparation of, or support the preparation of, the above documents.
- 2.1.2 The duty only applies where such activities relate to a 'strategic matter'. A 'strategic matter' is defined by the Act (Section 33A, part (4)) as:
  - a) "sustainable development or use of land that has or would have a significant impact on at least two planning areas, including (in particular) sustainable development or use of land for or in connection with infrastructure that is strategic and has or would have a significant impact on at least two planning areas, and
  - b) sustainable development or use of land in a two-tier area if the development or use—
    - (i) is a county matter, or
    - (ii) has or would have a significant impact on a county matter."

## 2.2 National Planning Policy Framework 2012 (NPPF)

2.2.1 Paragraph 178 of the NPPF states that cooperation under the duty particularly applies to the 'strategic priorities' set out in paragraph 156 of the NPPF. The strategic priorities set out at paragraph 156 are:

- The homes and jobs needed in the area;
- The provision of retail, leisure and other commercial development;
- The provision of infrastructure for transport, telecommunications, waste management, water supply, wastewater, flood risk and coastal change management, and the provision of minerals and energy (including heat);
- The provision of health, security, community and cultural infrastructure and other local facilities; and
- Climate change mitigation and adaptation, conservation and enhancement of the natural and historic environment, including landscape.
- 2.2.2 Paragraphs 178 to 182 of the NPPF set out the national policy for planning strategically across local boundaries and the role of duty to cooperate in the examination of plans.

## Figure 1- Extract from NPPF: paragraphs 178-182

## Planning strategically across local boundaries

- 178. Public bodies have a duty to cooperate on planning issues that cross administrative boundaries, particularly those which relate to the strategic priorities set out in paragraph 156. The Government expects joint working on areas of common interest to be diligently undertaken for the mutual benefit of neighbouring authorities.
- 179. Local planning authorities should work collaboratively with other bodies to ensure that strategic priorities across local boundaries are properly coordinated and clearly reflected in individual Local Plans. Joint working should enable local planning authorities to work together to meet development requirements which cannot wholly be met within their own areas for instance, because of a lack of physical capacity or because to do so would cause significant harm to the principles and policies of this Framework. As part of this process, they should consider producing joint planning policies on strategic matters and informal strategies such as joint infrastructure and investment plans.
- 180. Local planning authorities should take account of different geographic areas, including travelto-work areas. In two tier areas, county and district authorities should cooperate with each other on relevant issues. Local planning authorities should work collaboratively on strategic planning priorities to enable delivery of sustainable development in consultation with Local Enterprise Partnerships and Local Nature Partnerships. Local planning authorities should also work collaboratively with private sector bodies, utility and infrastructure providers.
- 181. Local planning authorities will be expected to demonstrate evidence of having effectively cooperated to plan for issues with cross-boundary impacts when their Local Plans are submitted for examination. This could be by way of plans or policies prepared as part of a joint committee, a memorandum of understanding or a jointly prepared strategy which is presented as evidence of an agreed position. Cooperation should be a continuous process of engagement from initial thinking through to implementation, resulting in a final position where plans are in place to provide the land and infrastructure necessary to support current and projected future levels of development.

## **Examining Local Plans**

182. The Local Plan will be examined by an independent inspector whose role is to assess whether the plan has been prepared in accordance with the Duty to Cooperate, legal and procedural requirements, and whether it is sound. ..."

- 2.2.3 Furthermore, there are two tests of soundness in the NPPF (paragraph 182) which relate directly to the duty:
  - Positively prepared the plan should be prepared based on a strategy which seeks to meet objectively assessed development and infrastructure requirements including unmet requirements from neighbouring authorities where it is reasonable to do so and consistent with achieving sustainable development.
  - *Effective* the plan should be deliverable over its period and based on effective joint working on cross-boundary strategic priorities.

## 2.3 National Planning Practice Guidance (NPPG)

- 2.3.1 The NPPG (Ref ID 9-006-20140306) makes it clear that Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEPs) and Local Nature Partnerships (LNPs) "are not subject to the requirements of the duty", but the Act (at 33(A)(2)(b)) and the Town and Country Planning Regulations require a local planning authority to have 'regard to activities' which they undertake.
- 2.3.2 Therefore, in effect, a 'duty to cooperate' exists between a local planning authority and the LEP / LNP and therefore for the purposes of the Central Lincolnshire Local Plan, those two bodies will be treated as being a full duty to cooperate body. For Central Lincolnshire the two bodies are:
  - LEP Greater Lincolnshire Local Enterprise Partnership (GLLEP)
  - LNP Greater Lincolnshire Nature Partnership (GLNP)
- 2.3.3 For the avoidance for doubt, no other bodies, organisations, utility providers or other companies have been treated as falling under the duty to cooperate requirements.
- 2.3.4 The NPPG also makes the following guidance provisions in relation to the duty:
  - The duty to cooperate is not a duty to agree. (Ref ID 9-003-20140306)
  - Local planning authorities and other public bodies need to work together from the outset at the plan scoping and evidence gathering stages before options for the planning strategy are identified. That will help to identify and assess the implications of any strategic cross boundary issues on which they need to work together and maximise the effectiveness of Local Plans. After that they will need to continue working together to develop effective planning policies and delivery strategies.
     Cooperation should continue until plans are submitted for examination and beyond, into delivery and review. (Ref ID 9-012-20140306)

## 2.4 Prescribed Bodies for Central Lincolnshire

2.4.1 The full list of 'prescribed bodies' that fall under the duty are set out in the Act itself plus the subsequent Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012. For Central Lincolnshire, they are as follows.

## 2.4.2 Local Planning Authorities

The Central Lincolnshire Joint Strategic Planning Committee has taken this to mean all neighbouring authorities, namely:

• City of Lincoln Council\*

- North Kesteven District Council\*
- West Lindsey District Council\*
- Bassetlaw District Council
- Boston Borough Council
- East Lindsey District Council
- Newark and Sherwood District Council
- North Lincolnshire Council
- North East Lincolnshire Council
- South East Lincolnshire Joint Policy Unit
- South Holland District Council
- South Kesteven District Council

\*These three districts are not 'neighbouring authorities' as the Local Plan covers their areas, but they do retain local planning authority functions in their own right, and therefore have been included in the list above. See also further details on the CLJSPC in section 2.5.

## 2.4.3 County Councils

The CLJSPC has taken this to mean the County Council that covers the planning area, as well as all County Council(s) which physically border Central Lincolnshire, namely:

- Lincolnshire County Council
- Nottinghamshire County Council

## 2.4.4 Other prescribed bodies

- Environment Agency
- Historic England (formerly English Heritage)
- Natural England
- Civil Aviation Authority
- Homes and Communities Agency
- Lincolnshire West Clinical Commissioning Group
- Lincolnshire East Clinical Commissioning Group
- South West Lincolnshire Clinical Commissioning Group
- National Health Service England
- Office of Road and Rail
- Highways England
- Marine Management Organisation
- 2.4.5 The Greater Lincolnshire Local Enterprise Partnership (GLLEP) and Greater Lincolnshire Nature Partnership (GLNP) have also been treated as falling under the duty to cooperate requirements for the reasons outlined at 2.3.1.
- 2.4.6 Legally, the duty also applies to the bodies below. However, the CLJSPC has decided that, in order to meet the requirement in the Act to maximise the effectiveness of preparing the Local Plan it would be unnecessary, and indeed contrary to achieving 'effectiveness', to actively seek cooperation with the following prescribed bodies:
  - Mayor of London
  - Transport for London

2.4.7 Furthermore, the duty requires CLJSPC to consult the Integrated Transport Authority. At the time of preparing the Local Plan such an authority does not currently exist in the local area.

## 2.5 Clarification of 'Central Lincolnshire' for plan making purposes

- 2.5.1 The Central Lincolnshire Joint Strategic Planning Committee (CLJSPC) was established in October 2009, supported by a small Central Lincolnshire Local Plan Team. The legal basis for the CLJSPC is set out in the Central Lincolnshire Joint Strategic Planning Committee Order 2009. This Order establishes a joint committee to be the local planning authority for the City of Lincoln, the district of North Kesteven and the district of West Lindsey for the purposes of Part 2 of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 (the 2004 Act). The Order reflects an agreement made between the councils of those areas and Lincolnshire County Council. - 2.5.2 The reasoning behind setting up the CLJSPC (and the subsequent production of a joint Local Plan) was the recognition of the significant amount of cross- boundary growth that will be needed on the edge of the Lincoln urban area. In order to facilitate this growth in an effective, cohesive and sustainable manner, the local planning authorities responsible for the Local Plan making that will accommodate and allocate growth in Central Lincolnshire are committed to working together to produce a Local Plan(s). To assist with the delivery of the required growth, the local planning authorities and Lincolnshire County Council therefore asked the Secretary of State to establish a joint committee.
- 2.5.3 Thus, whilst the Order (2009) pre-dates the Duty to Cooperate legislation (2011), it is in fact an excellent example of cooperation between four bodies subject to the Duty to Cooperate. There was no legal requirement to come together as a single Joint Committee, nor was the Order forced upon the four authorities – indeed, it was the opposite. The four authorities volunteered to come together (i.e. to cooperate), and to do so to the extent that each was willing to lose its own plan-making ability, and devolve this ability to the Joint Committee.
- 2.5.4 The Committee itself comprises of 12 councillors (3 each) from the City of Lincoln Council, North Kesteven District Council, West Lindsey District Council and Lincolnshire County Council. For accountability and administrative purposes, North Kesteven District Council is the responsible body.

# 3. Strategic Context

## 3.1 Strategic Geography

3.1.1 The Central Lincolnshire Local Plan will cover the geographical area of the City of Lincoln, North Kesteven and West Lindsey District Councils. For some issues, the strategic geography of the Local Plan extends wider than this physical geography. The strategic geographies are set out below.

## 3.2 Strategic Development Priorities

3.2.1 The priorities for Central Lincolnshire are set out in section 2.5 'Our Objectives' of the Local Plan. The strategic development priorities are:

### Housing -

To ensure that the housing stock meets the housing needs of the Central Lincolnshire area.

The Local Plan aims to achieve this by delivering 36,960 dwellings (policy LP3).

### Employment and local economy -

To create and improve access to high quality employment and training opportunities for everyone within the Central Lincolnshire area. To encourage and support a competitive, diverse and stable economy and to protect and enhance Central Lincolnshire's hierarchy of centres to meet the needs of residents and visitors.

The Local Plan allocation of 111.1 hectares of employment land across seven Strategic Employment Sites and provision of 42 hectares of employment land through the Sustainable Urban Extension (SUE) sites (policy LP5) will significantly contribute to the achievement of these priorities.

### Transport and accessibility -

To make efficient use of the existing transport infrastructure, reduce the need to travel by car, improve accessibility to jobs and services for all and to ensure that all journeys are undertaken by the most sustainable travel modes (particularly public transport, walking and cycling).

To achieve this the Local Plan sets out various general accessibility and transport criteria (policy LP13) as well as more detailed requirements in relation to the SUEs which are major growth sites (policies LP28, LP30, LP39 and LP44). The Local Plan also safeguards land for the future development of the Lincoln Eastern Bypass and Lincoln Southern Bypass (policy LP38).

## 3.3 Key Relationships and Bodies

3.3.1 The working relationships used to address the strategic priorities and the bodies involved are detailed in section 4 of this report.

## 4. Strategic Planning Issues

## 4.1 Summary of strategic planning issues, partners and evidence of joint working

4.1.1 Table 2 below shows how the strategic planning issues (as defined by the NPPF) of the Central Lincolnshire Local Plan have been addressed through joint working.

## 5. Conclusion

- 5.1 In preparing the Central Lincolnshire Local Plan, considerable efforts to cooperate with the various Duty to Cooperate bodies and organisations has taken place.
- 5.2 As detailed in Section 4 of this report, no prescribed body has, at the point of writing (April 2016), made any representation, either during or outside of a formal consultation stage, which states that they have a specific concern under the Duty to Cooperate. However, a number of those bodies have, appropriately, raised detailed matters on, for example, policy wording and/or have contributed to various elements of the evidence base. We have worked closely with each to address these concerns, as far as possible.
- 5.3 Overall, therefore, the Central Lincolnshire Joint Strategic Planning Committee is not aware of any Duty to Cooperate issues, and is not expecting any Duty to Cooperate issue to be raised at the forthcoming Proposed Submission consultation stage. If this position changes as a result of representations received at the consultation stage, either this Statement will be revised accordingly, or a supplementary note prepared.

I am writing to you to seek your views under the Duty to Corporate (section 33A of the Planning Compulsory Purchase Act).

By way of context, separately you should have received notification that the Central Lincolnshire Joint Strategic Planning Committee (CLISPC) is consulting on a new Local Plan for the Central Lincolnshire area, which covers the local authority areas of West Lindsey, City of Lincoln and North Kesteven. The Further Draft (October 2015) consultation version of the Local Plan sets out the CLISPC long-term vision and objectives for the area, and the policies and proposals that will help direct how new development and regeneration will be achieved, including site allocations for housing and employment development.

The Further Draft Consultation Local Plan proposes a total dwelling target of 36,960 dwellings over the 2012 – 2036 plan period. This amount is based on the objectively assessed need (OAN) identified by the CLISPC at its meeting of 7 September 2015, as informed by the 2015 Strategic Housing Market Assessment (SHMA), which is available on our website. For the avoidance of doubt, therefore, the Further Draft Local Plan (October 2015) proposes to meet the Central Lincolnshire dwelling OAN in full, and the CLISPC is not requesting that any adjoining local authority or wider housing market area 'take' any of its 36,960 housing need.

In this context, I can also confirm that we have not, to date, received any requests from any local authority to take any of our OAN. Similarly, the CLISPC is not seeking to accommodate any housing need arising in any adjoining authority or wider housing market area.

### Re: Central Lincolnshire Consultation Event: Local Plan, CIL and Other Documents

Thank you for your invitation to respond to the consultation on the Draft Local Plan for Central Lincolnshire and associated documents. On behalf of Bassetlaw District Council I am writing to let you know that Bassetlaw is broadly supportive of the plan's content and do not wish to make any objections at this time.

The Draft Local Plan and associated documents also include a number of items that we would like to express our strong support for:

- The role of Gainsborough as a service centre for settlements in the eastern part of Bassetlaw district is acknowledged by our own Core Strategy (Adopted December 2011). As such Bassetlaw welcomes the proposed strengthening of the town's offer, particularly the range of services and attractions offered by the town centre and we look forward to reviewing the Strategic Town Centre Investment Plan when it becomes available. Consequently we would welcome the acknowledgement in the supporting text of Gainsborough's role as a service centre for villages in eastern parts of Bassetlaw.
- 2. The Infrastructure Plan acknowledges that secondary schools in Gainsborough are close to capacity but that no new secondary provision is currently planned in the first stages of the planned Sustainable Urban Extensions. Gainsborough's schools currently attract a number of pupils from Bassetlaw and we would not wish to see this choice reduced. To this end we strongly support the ambition that new secondary provision should be part of the development of these extensions.
- We welcome the acknowledgement of Bassetlaw as a key stakeholder in relation to economic development along the A1 corridor and would be very happy to engage in discussions around any ideas about how this might be taken forward.

- 4. Following our previous meetings to address the Duty to Cooperate we support the inclusion in both the Draft Local Plan and Draft Infrastructure Delivery Plan of train services between Lincoln, Gainsborough and Sheffield as a priority for improvement, not least through the next Northern Rail franchise. This is something where we, as an Authority, can see the intrinsic economic prosperity potential this could have. As such we intend to liaise with the County Council to further promote its benefit.
- Further to meetings to address the Duty to Cooperate we would welcome the inclusion of the ambition to improve road connectivity across the River Trent, as a shared ambition for both Central Lincolnshire and Bassetlaw.

We hope that these observations are helpful but please do not hesitate to get in touch if you would like to discuss them in further detail.



Firstly, as a matter of procedure, it would seem somewhat at odds with the purpose of the Duty to Cooperate process not to consult the South East Lincolnshire Joint Planning Unit itself but merely to consult the individual Councils separately. Notwithstanding the possibility that both Boston Borough Council and South Holland District Council may wish to respond as statutory bodies in their own right the South East Lincolnshire Joint Planning Unit is also a statutory body.
With regard to the main proposals in the Central Lincolnshire Further Draft Local Plan the South East Lincolnshire Joint Planning Unit have the following concerns.
Level of Housing Growth
The proposed provision of 36,960 new dwellings would seem to represent a 60% increase on the household projection figures released by the DCLG in 2012.
It is accepted that assessing the Objectively Assessed Need for Housing starts with considering the DCLG household projections and also takes into account local evidence in extrapolating projections. The evidence given in the Central Lincolnshire SHMA does not appear cohesive or well justified in concluding that the housing needs for the Central Lincolnshire plan area should be 60% above the DCLG 2012 projections. The SHMA evidence seems to rely upon a mixture of factors; periods when housing completion rates were much higher and also extrapolating much higher inmigration rates. Also leading the argument for a much higher level of housing growth, is that, it is necessary to meet economic investment and a substantial growth in jobs.
The email circulated by Central Lincolnshire in launching the latest consultation and Duty to Cooperate assumes that the levels of housing growth proposed in Central Lincolnshire will not have an impact upon other plan areas or housing growth in those areas. However it is generally accepted at the plan making level and, indeed, specified in the Boston SHMA and Peterborough Sub-Region SHMA that significantly different projections from the DCLG household projections do constitute a Duty to Cooperate issue for affected authorities.
Distribution of Housing Growth
In particular the levels of housing growth for Sleaford would seem to be both disproportionate to the current town and also a significant threat to levels of housing growth being achieved for Boston.
An increase of 4,435 homes for Sleaford represents a growth in population of over 10,000 people in a town where the current population is about 17,500.
Boston Borough and North Kesteven (Sleaford) have a, more or less, balanced place of work/place of residence relationship; generally self contained housing market/travel to work areas. In proposing a substantial increase in housing for Sleaford this equilibrium would be significantly skewed and at present the impacts of this are difficult to determine as the growth may be driven by job creation in Sleaford itself or elsewhere.

#### Delivery of Housing Growth

The background paper Housing Growth Delivery Plan that accompanies the CL Further Draft Local Plan states that attracting more developers to deliver housing in Central Lincolnshire is a key challenge. This is a key challenge for most Local Planning Authorities and clearly a specific strategy to attract developers must impact upon neighbouring authorities especially where the housing growth proposed is significantly higher than DCLG projections. Even if housing need targets are not met in Central Lincolnshire, a much greater choice of opportunity for developers, driven by disproportionately greater levels of growth, will result.

Boston Borough and the northern part of South Holland (including Spalding) have Housing Market Areas that can only meet housing needs generated to the north, south and west as the North Sea lies to the east. Therefore the influence of housing growth opportunities immediately to the west are significant.

#### Provision of Infrastructure

South East Lincolnshire and Central Lincolnshire rely upon the same infrastructure providers to support future development. In particular the provision of roads, healthcare, education and social services are effectively a shared resource and Countywide commitment. All new development will require a commitment and prioritisation of resources. A substantially different approach to growth in Central Lincolnshire might compromise what infrastructure can be committed to support the growth proposed in South East Lincolnshire.

## Appendix 3: Actions arising and resolution of issues

## South East Lincolnshire Joint Policy Unit

Following the South East Lincolnshire Joint Policy Unit's (SELJPU) response to our email regarding the duty to cooperate, the Central Lincolnshire Local Plan Team took the following action to address the matters raised.

## Strategic Planning Issue:

Response received from SELJPU (19 November 2015) raising various concerns in relation to:

- The overall housing growth target of 36,960 dwellings.
- The Sleaford target of 4,435 dwellings.
- The implications that the growth in Central Lincolnshire will have on the delivery of housing growth in South East Lincolnshire.
- The implications that the growth in Central Lincolnshire will have for the delivery of infrastructure in South East Lincolnshire, given that both areas rely on the same infrastructure providers.

## Actions:

The Central Lincolnshire Local Plan Team replied to the SELJPU (22 February 2016) asking for clarification as to whether, under the duty to cooperate obligations and assuming the growth levels remained unchanged, the South East Lincolnshire Joint Policy Unit would be (or indeed were at that present time) raising a duty to cooperate objection regarding the level of growth in Central Lincolnshire and / or Sleaford, given that their representation expressed concern rather than an outright objection.

Discussions took place between the SELJPU and the Central Lincolnshire Local Plan Team, and the SELJPU confirmed that they no longer wished to pursue their concerns, but would continue to follow progress on the emerging Central Lincolnshire Local Plan.

## Outcome:

SELIPU confirmed (February 2016) that they no longer wished to pursue their original concerns in relation to the duty.

## Ongoing cooperation:

SELJPU reserve the right to make further / additional comments under the duty during the consultation on the Proposed Submission Local Plan. If any comments/ objections are raised during this consultation, the Central Lincolnshire Local Plan Team will work with the SELJPU to address the issues raised and hopefully achieve a satisfactory outcome for both parties.
